# Financial Aid Night

This year there are major changes and improvements coming to the 2024-25 FAFSA form. As a result, the new form will not be available in October, like it has in the past, but rather December 2023. As a result our Financial Aid night will look a lot different.

We encourage students and parents to come to the financial aid night on October 24 open house style starting around 5. Here you will be able to create an FSA ID, both parent and student must create their own individual ID. It is important both parties are available.

The FSA ID must be created prior to completion on the FAFSA. Parent and student will need access to their social security

number. While you will not be able to do the actual FAFSA application, we will have Amber Taylor available for questions and to schedule times to complete the application once it opens.

# Senior State ACT

**When:** October 17th , seniors need to be here by 7:50. If they are late they will not test.

**Who:** Seniors who have chosen to retake the ACT

**Where:** MVHS

**What's needed:** adequate rest, healthy breakfast, no cell phones, and no food/drink during testing. Students will have access to fruit during the break.

After the ACT test the seniors will receive a longer lunch break and then are expected to be back at the start of 4th hour. Lunches can be held for them in the cafeteria, please let Mrs. Hauf know if your student would like a lunch.

**SENIORS****Checklist for October**

- ◇ Register for the December ACT (in Evanston or Lyman) if you need to.
- ◇ Request applications, financial aid and other information from schools.
- ◇ Search for private or national scholarships over the internet and look for e-mails from Mrs. Hauf.
- ◇ Talk with college representatives when they visit the school.
- ◇ Explore college websites for schools you are interested in. Remember to have four colleges in mind, a reach school, two schools you are comfortable with, and a safety net school.

**NCAA Reminders** (see next page)

**9th Grade:** Make sure you are taking NCAA approved classes.

**10th Grade:** Register with NCAA at [eligibilitycenter.org](http://eligibilitycenter.org)

**11th Grade:** Make sure you will graduate with the required number of NCAA core courses. Take the ACT or SAT. Have high school counselor upload your transcript to NCAA Eligibility Center.

**12th Grade:** Complete NCAA core courses. Take ACT and send scores to NCAA (code 9999). Apply to schools, request final amateurism certification beginning April 1st. Have high school counselor upload final high school transcript to NCAA.

**Hathaway Scholarship**

Hathaway offers four individual scholarships and a need-based scholarship that can supplement these merit-based awards.

**Honors-** \$1,680 for 8 full-time semesters

**25 ACT 3.5 GPA**

4 years of English, 4 years of math, 3 years of social studies, 4 years of science, 4 years of either fine and performing arts, foreign language or career and technical education. **2 of the 4 years must be sequenced**

**Performance-** \$1,260 for 8 full-time semesters

**21 ACT 3.0 GPA**

4 years of English, 4 years of math, 3 years of social studies, 4 years of science, and 4 years of either fine and performing arts, foreign language or career and technical education. **2 of the 4 years must be sequenced**

**Opportunity-** \$840 for 8 full-time semesters

**19 ACT 2.5 GPA**

4 years of English, 4 years of math, 3 years of social studies, and 4 years of science, 2 years of either fine and performing arts, career and technical education, or foreign language (FL must be sequenced)

**Provisional-** \$840-4 full-time semesters at a community college.

**17 ACT 2.5 GPA**

4 years of English, 3 years of math

- » After you graduate, ask your high school counselor to upload your final **official transcript** with proof of graduation to your Eligibility Center account.

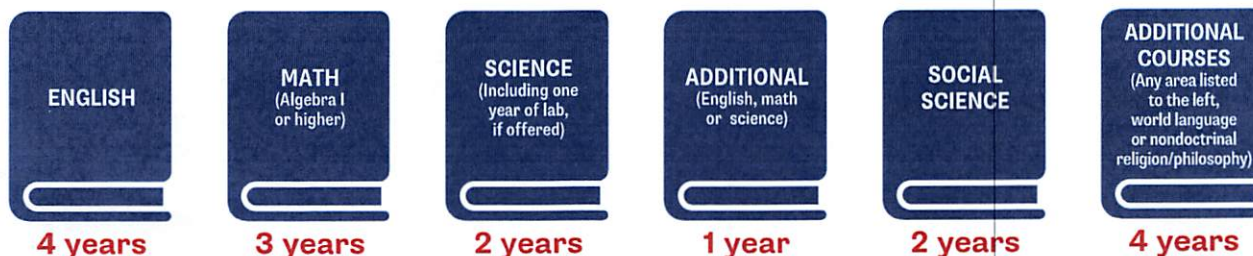
## ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

To study and compete at a Division I or II school, you must earn 16 NCAA-approved **core-course credits**, earn a minimum 2.3 (Division I) or 2.2 (Division II) **core-course GPA** and submit your final transcript with proof of graduation to the Eligibility Center.

## CORE-COURSE REQUIREMENTS

### DIVISION I

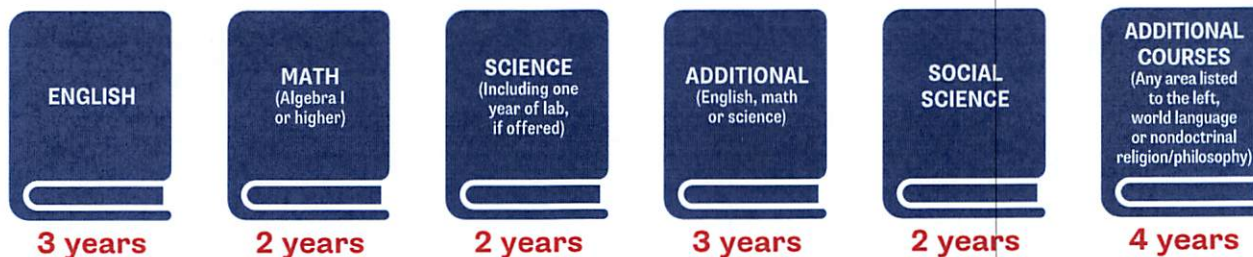
Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the following areas:



For Division I, 10 of your 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits must be completed before the start of your seventh semester, including seven in English, math or science.

### DIVISION II

Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the following areas:



## GRADE-POINT AVERAGE

The Eligibility Center calculates your **core-course GPA** based on the grades you earn in NCAA-approved core courses.

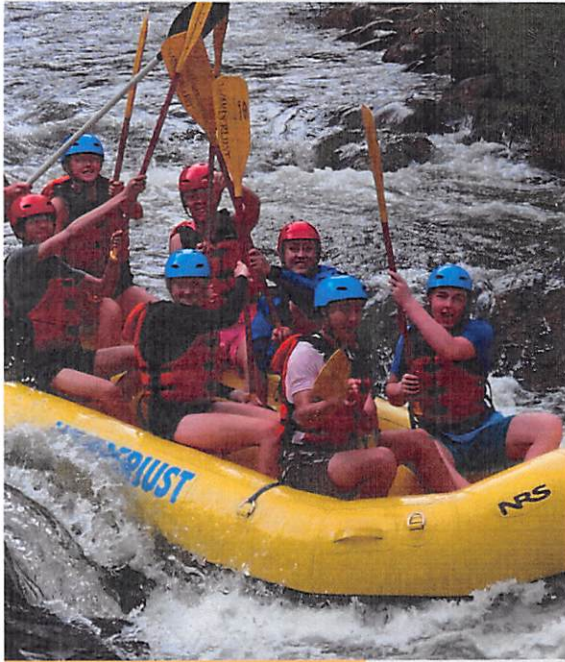
- » Division I requires a minimum 2.3 core-course GPA.
- » Division II requires a minimum 2.2 core-course GPA.

### DIVISION III

While **Division III schools** set their own admissions and academic requirements, **international student-athletes** (first-year enrollees and transfers) who initially enroll full time at a Division III school on or after Aug. 1, 2023, are required to complete an **Amateurism-Only Certification account**. Contact the Division III school you plan to attend for more information about its academic requirements.

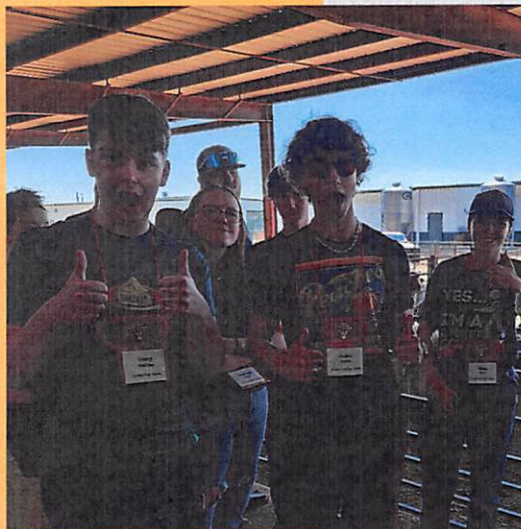
